

## Building code course given at UBVC

The Uintah Basin Area Vocational Center announced this week the beginning of a special course on the Uniform Building Code. The course will prepare participants to fully understand the details of the building code and will be especially important to those persons who have the responsibility as building inspectors for municipalities, school districts, and other state and local building projects as well as private contractors.

Ron Ivie, building inspector for Park City, will provide instruction and current information on the code. Those persons who complete the course will be prepared for certification by the state. Mr. Ivie has taught this subject at the Utah Technical College in Salt Lake City for several years and has in-depth knowledge of the code requirements. He also stated that this course would be very important for any persons who are in the field of engineering, architecture, building design or contracting and will probably soon become a requirement for building inspectors to be certified.

The 20 hour course will be conducted at the UBVC in Roosevelt in Room D10/12 beginning on Saturday night March 26 from 7 to 9 p.m. and continuing each Saturday evening until May 28. ## UBAVC classes start next week

Summer quarter classes will start June 13 and end August 12 at the Uintah Basin Area Vocational Center. Classes will be taught by Cleo Riding at 1077 North 2500 West in Maeser at the Adult Education Center daily from 8:00-4:00 p.m. Dennis Garner, Business Department Chairman will teach the classes daily from 8:00-4:00 at the UBAVC in Roosevelt.

Classes offered include accounting; typewriting, office occupations, business machines, machine transcription, shorthand, business English, math and basic computers.

Utah State University and Utah Technical College credit is available

for most classes offered through the UBAVC.

A Basic Computer Concepts Class will be taught in Roosevelt starting June 13-August 12. Lectures will be held Tuesdays and Wednesdays and the lab on Monday and Thursdays from 1:30-3:00 p.m.

A summer co-op program for secondary students is also available. This is a regular co-op program which includes "on-the-job" supervision and coordination as well as instruction in a related class. The participants will be required to attend an evening class one or two nights a week—depending on the amount of credit desired.

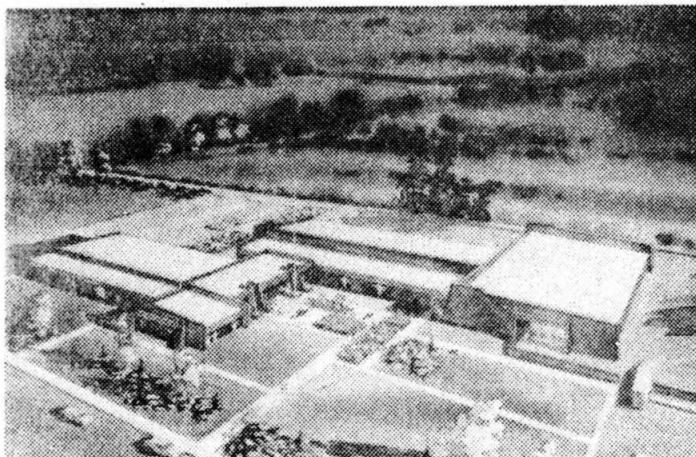

# Vocational Center given accreditation approval

Marlin Johnson, director of the Uintah Basin Area Vocational Center, announced this week receipt of a letter from the State Director of Vocational-Technical Education, Walter E. Ulrich, informing him that the UBAVC has been awarded provisional accreditation based upon the evaluation accreditation visit by the staff of the Vocational Education Division. The Utah State Board for Vocational Education has been authorized by the U.S. Commissioner of Education to accredit post-secondary area vocational schools in the state of Utah.

MR. JOHNSON explained the requirements which the Area Vocational School must maintain in order to be awarded accreditation approval, are: developing and maintaining high quality programs consistent with vocational standards, strong and supportive administration, appropriate facilities, equipment and materials; curricula designed to meet labor market needs; and instructors that are qualified to teach skills, stimulate students and interpret employer needs.

The Uintah Basin Area Vocational Center meets or exceeds the standards as outlined by the Vocational Board and is continuing to seek further improvements and excellence beyond what is required so that accreditation may be assured for future years and confidence and credibility maintained with the students who come to the Area Vocational School for help, and the employers who hire them.

Johnson released information concerning the details of the standards for accreditation in the various categories as follows: administrative functions will include accurate financial records so that expenditures are made according to approved budget documents; training programs will be planned and conducted in close relationship to the job market; service will be maintained at the placement record for students completing courses must be high; permanent

student records must be accurately maintained to provide all pertinent data about student goals and courses taken with credits and certificates earned; vocational staff shall be certified according to the state plan, teaching loads assure that students have reasonable contact with instructors in order to receive the help necessary to succeed in course work, annual evaluations of staff will be conducted to encourage continued improvement.

CURRICULA will be articulated between the Area Vocational School and school districts to provide more efficient and effective programming; state curriculum guides as adopted will be used to assure program continuity between institutions to better benefit students, course content is based on skills and knowledge required for specific occupation; mathematics and communications skills are designed to relate to the occupation for which a student is training.

Student personnel services will include as a minimum, adequate vocational counseling; job placement; job placement service will be maintained at the placement record for students completing courses must be high; permanent

scholarships and work experience; tools, equipment, materials and supplies used for instruction shall be consistent with job training objectives.

"Accreditation indicates that the school is prepared and fully capable to accomplish their designated function at a high level efficiency with full accountability to both students and taxpayers for the educational time and money invested. Accreditation also assures transfer of credits to other educational institutions when a student may find it necessary to change schools," said Johnson.

DURING the second year of provisional approval, the Vocational School will be required to prepare a self evaluation study and will be evaluated by an on site evaluation team. At the conclusion of the second year study, full accreditation will be awarded for a five year period.

The Vocational Center is prepared to accept students in business education programs for full daytime training at both

Roosevelt and Vernal and during evening hours Tuesday in Vernal and Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday in Roosevelt. Most all other classes are available for adult students during evening hours at the Center in Roosevelt. Visitors may also visit the new vocational building across the street south of the present center in Roosevelt, which is nearing completion.
